## Our Mission

The Haywood County Sheriff's Office will use every resource at our disposal to protect our God given rights as intended by our federal and state constitutions; to suppress crime and bring perpetrators before a court of law affording all due process; to maintain a safe, efficient, and effective detention center; to work with and promote the efficiency of our court system; to promote the well-being of our county in every way possible; to provide the most effective and professional services possible; and to carry with us and display the integrity and transparency of our actions as we serve.



### **Our Vision**

## **Patrol**

Our Patrol Division consists of four squads that work 12-hour shifts. Each of these squads have seven deputies assigned to the county including one deputy that covers the Town of Clyde.

Patrol is divided into four squads of seven deputies each, with one squad on duty at a time. Each squad has a sergeant and five deputies and one deputy assigned to the Town of Clyde. Patrol works twelve-hour shifts and is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Our Patrol is often supplemented by deputies from other divisions and part-time officers.

Deputies respond to calls for service, conduct minor criminal investigations, collect evidence, surveil problem areas, address domestic issues and neighbor disputes, serve involuntary commitments, serve warrants and civil papers, initiate missing person searches, patrol business districts and residential neighborhoods, and enforce criminal and traffic laws. To better get to know our citizens, our deputies also participate in a variety of community-related events across the county.

Haywood County Sheriff's Office Civil Process Division, one of the oldest documented responsibilities of a County Sheriff, consists of deputies who work civil process, child support, domestic violence, litter enforcement and tax collection.

Civil Process is responsible for the service of civil papers in Haywood County as outlined by the North Carolina general statutes. The Haywood County Sheriff's Office is entrusted to serve civil processes in a professional and timely manner. The division serves not only those processes which originate in Haywood County, but from other counties and states, as well. These processes include:

- Civil and Magistrate Summons
- Claim & Deliveries
- Writs for Possession & Writs of Execution
- Civil Orders for Arrest

- Tax Warrants
- Attachments
- Temporary & Permanent Restraining orders
- Child Custody Orders

### 87,127 Citizens through Metal Detection System

One of the duties of the Sheriff, as compelled by North Carolina General Statute, is to provide security in the courtrooms within their county.

During operating hours at the Haywood County Justice Center, a deputy is stationed at the metal detector. Deputies help ensure the safety of court personnel and citizens entering the facility by searching bags and briefcases and scanning everyone with the metal detector.

In 2023 there were 87,127 citizens that went through the metal detection system.

The justice center and the historic courthouse are used after hours by the community and local government groups. At least two deputies must be on hand at all times while people are in the building. Deputies are present at events such as N.C. Bar Association meetings and all county commissioner meetings. **In 2023, there were**651 Court Sessions. These include District, Superior, Juvenile, Child Support and DSS Courts.

The Haywood County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Division, CID, handles cases not readily resolvable on the initial call. These cases usually demand significantly more time than a patrol deputy can devote to a single case, and often require specialized training, experience and/or expertise.

CID consists of 8 full time investigators and one full time evidence technician. They are assigned cases which include general property crimes, child abuse, sexual assaults, domestic violence, murder, fraud and identity theft. This team has been instrumental in returning money, equipment, vehicles, and personal property back to the citizens of Haywood County.

## Crime Suppression Unit

The Haywood County Sheriff's Office Crime Suppression Unit (CSU) is two teams. Each team having a Sergeant and multiple team members.

The focus of CSU is on high crime problems that arise within our communities related to nuisance locations, property crimes and narcotics. They work with stake holders and citizens in their communities to reach long-term solutions. CSU works in conjunction with the Criminal Investigation Division and they remain vigilant within the communities to suppress crime.

## K-9 Unit

The Haywood County Sheriff's Office K9 Unit is made up of six K9's. Our K9s are all trained in tracking, evidence recovery, and narcotic detection. Two of the six are considered full patrol K9s. They are also trained in the apprehension of suspects. Our other four K9s have been used to track suspects, lost children, and elderly with dementia. All of our handlers train a minimum of 10 hours per month with their partners. This year our K9s were responsible for removing nearly 500 grams of narcotics from Haywood County.

Upon approval by the County Commissioners, we were approved to spend drug asset forfeiture funds to purchase an additional K9 unit. On December 8th, 2023, Deputy Mease and his new partner, K9 Bren, graduated from K9 School. It was a special day to announce the name of our newest K9 as "Bren", in honor of our fallen brother, Deputy Brennan Mehaffey. After the graduation ceremony concluded, we unveiled the new K9 car for Deputy Mease and for Brennan's parents, Carroll and Nancie Mehaffey.

An additional approval of drug asset forfeiture funds, allowed us to purchase K9 Riley from the Canton Police Department. Both K9 Riley and his partner, Deputy Travis Johnson, joined our team in August, 2023.



## S.R.T Special Response Team







Haywood County SRT trains twice a month to maintain skills needed for high-risk warrant services, search and rescue operations, tracking lost or injured persons, safely resolving incidents regarding barricaded persons, injured person extraction, and many other scenarios that have become commonplace in today's society.







## Communications Center

The Haywood County 911 Communications Center, also known as Haywood Communications, answers emergency and non-emergency calls for service 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and dispatches the appropriate help. The professional staff is dedicated to providing quality service not only to our citizens but also to the first responders that we serve.

The 911 Telecommunicators are the "first" emergency responders and play a critical role in answering any call for assistance. No matter what discipline of emergency services is needed, the telecommunicator must be efficient and professional to ensure the proper resources are sent to an appropriate location and that the responding field agencies receive the correct information.

There were approximately <u>170,000</u> telephone calls answered in the Communications Center in 2023, which continues to increase each year. A Telecommunicator takes one call at a time, does it quickly, gets it out to responders, and moves on to the next call. Any delay in getting help to the caller could mean the difference between life and death.

Currently there are 19 Full Time and 8 part time Telecommunicators employed by the Sheriff's Office. There are four on duty at all times working 12-hour shifts. There are also call takers that work 8am-5pm (Monday-Friday) and 2pm-2am (7 days a week). There is also a manager who generally works weekdays who oversees the entire operation.

Haywood County 911 Director Chanda Morgan received the North Carolina APCO Communications Director of the Year award for 2023 in Wilmington for dedicated service to the public safety communications industry and service to the citizens of Haywood County.

















## **Detention Center**

The Haywood County Detention Center houses 109 inmates. All pre-trial arrestees unable to make bond in Haywood County as well as inmates who are sentenced or ordered to be held in custody by the courts are held in our confinement facility. The Detention Center utilizes an in-direct supervision style of inmate management and comprises five different housing units with a booking area and central control. Several facilities are comprised of a medical unit, a video-to-video visitation lobby, inmate laundry services, facility maintenance, and a large kitchen area.

In May of 2023, a Classification Case Manager/Reintegration Programs Coordinator was added to the staff at the Detention Center. This role plays an important part in developing and expanding services to our inmates. These services include AA and NA meetings that take place within the Detention Center for men and women that choose to attend. In late 2023 those meetings were well attended and a wait-list was even started. In addition to those recovery groups, we have staff who interview and facilitate referrals to local treatment centers and recovery programs as needed.


